SUMMARY

Non-binding judicial arbitration gives the opportunity to newly practicing attorneys-or to seasoned counsel with little trial experience-the opportunity to hone their abilities; and, to present and to object to proffered evidence in a real-time environment.

The MCLE component capitalizes on that opportunity by offering MCLE credits for the self-study and exam passage that will only aid in the preparation of real-time cases.

To qualify for the MCLE credit, the participants must engage in self-study on topics identified in the course outline and supported by review of the pertinent Evid. Code sections.

Following self-study, the participants must pass an on-line exam with an 80% passage rate. The proposed exam consists of true/false and multiple choice questions.

The topic to be presented is the <u>California Evidence Code</u> with standards for admissibility for evidence to be identified, authenticated, and presented in a real-time, non-binding, arbitration.

The intention underlying the submitted outline is to require the participants to prepare their briefs with exhibits for on-line submittal; thereafter, to offer the exhibit; lay the requisite foundation; withstand anticipated objections; succeed in entering the exhibits into evidence at a real-time hearing; and, succeed in precluding the introduction of the opponent's evidence.
